There's a new direction for the one way system through Wandsworth. What will it mean for the Tonsleys?

As you may be aware, Transport For London and Wandsworth Council are planning to remove the one-way system from Wandsworth Town Centre and replace it with a scheme that routes the majority of the traffic along Armoury Way and Swandon Way.

The initial public consultation closed on 5th December 2014 and we are expecting another consultation this year on the finalised road layout shortly. Works are scheduled to start in 2017.

The proposed scheme sees the junction between Old York Road, Swandon Way, Armoury Way and Fairfield Street severed to make two independent roads with no junction between them.

Armoury Way and Swandon Way will become the new South Circular road in both directions, while Old York Road and Fairfield Street will be used by local traffic only. Wandsworth High Street will be largely closed to cars and will be available to buses, cyclists and pedestrians only.

This new arterial road layout impacts the Tonsleys in several ways, which are mostly but not entirely positive. Firstly, the removal of the junction at the end of Old York Road prevents it from being useful for traffic wishing to cut around Swandon Way in either direction, which you may remember caused enormous jams during the summer while Putney Bridge was closed for repairs.

There will also be no traffic light at the western end of Old York Road, removing the temptation for motorists to step on the accelerator to catch the short green light that is visible a couple of hundred yards in advance of the junction.

Secondly, the expected reduction in traffic, especially heavy goods vehicles, on Fairfield Street and East Hill should reduce noise for residents living along the western and southern edges of the Tonsleys. There may still be some sirens to hear though, as it is unlikely that emergency vehicles will be prohibited from using Wandsworth High Street.

We do not charge membership fees or have any funds. Other than printing costs, this newsletter received no sponsorship or donations.



It will become much easier and more pleasant for Tonsley residents to walk to the Southside, with a reduction in traffic fumes and the need to cross two or three very busy roads largely eliminated.

Lastly, it will become more difficult for Tonsley residents to travel by car in a westerly and southerly direction. It looks like there is no realistic route to the west except to go all the way around the roundabout at the southern end of Wandsworth Bridge, and then along Swandon Way and Armoury Way. Travel to the south will become somewhat harder, with the best route to Garratt Lane being via St. Ann's Hill and Allfarthing Lane.

Circling the roundabout may also become necessary for Tonsley residents wishing to gain access to the tip and B&Q if access to Smugglers Way from Swandon Way is indeed removed. This is not yet certain as the initial consultation revealed that the tour buses garaged behind McDonalds are too tall to fit under the bridge next to the Calor Gas Centre.

In the next public consultation, we are hoping but not expecting to see some information from Wandsworth Council to explain how residential streets might change in light of the differences in the surrounding arterial routes owned and managed by TFL. Our roads have many one-way sections designed to prevent drivers from using the Tonsleys as a rat run. Some of these sections may no longer be necessary, or may need to be reversed to run in the opposite direction.

Parking may also become an issue for Tonsley residents, especially those living towards the western end of the area.

The new retail development now taking shape at the Ram Brewery will include parking for residents but not for shoppers, who will be expected to use the existing car parks within the Southside development.

One can imagine that during the weekends those shoppers may prefer to park instead on our streets for free, and so parking restrictions may need to be changed to ensure there are enough spaces for residents. The council normally decides such changes on a street-by-street basis by canvassing residents and taking a majority opinion.

In summary, these changes should prove positive for the Tonsleys in the long term. At the moment, the majority of the traffic that surrounds us is just passing through the area, which means the drivers are less considerate and travel faster - often excessively so. There are heavy construction and haulage vehicles currently rumbling past the ends of Old York Road, Tonsley Place, Tonsley Hill, Alma Road and Dempster Road that simply won't be there any more. The under-utilized retail spaces on Fairfield Street and East Hill should become more attractive given the quieter nature of those streets, and we could see some new shops and restaurants as a result.

All of this can only be good news for relative house prices in the area and it will contribute to the Tonsleys remaining an appealing neighbourhood in which to live and work.

The chairman writes...

Despite upheavals and changes within our midst and developments further afield to the east, south and west, "The Tonsleys' remain a delightful and convenient place

We have low Council Tax, a comprehensive public transport system, delightful architecture, good pubs to live. and restaurants on our doorsteps and an increasingly diverse range of shops to tempt us not to stray beyond our borders.

Recent changes have seen the departure of Wandsworth Tyres and a whole new development arising in its place; the corner, ground floor looks like becoming another eatery. The derelict site on the western end of Old York Road at the junction of Morie Street is finally being developed paving the way for perhaps more interest at this end of the street. The changes outside the station are now complete with new landscaping and a permanent home for 'Pop-up Kitchen'

We have the new Mary Portas charity shop in our very heart. We should celebrate what we have and to that end we will be supporting the Street Party on June 7th as we have done every year it has been held.

However, perhaps bigger threats to life in this corner of SW18 lie beyond our immediate boundaries.

To the east, the developments at Nine Elms with the arrival of the new American Embassy will have far reaching and as yet untold consequences. South of us the routing of Crossrail 2 under Wandsworth Common is already a hotly disputed issue for residents in the neighbouring areas.

To the west, the Ram Brewery development is finally under way and it remains to be seen whether the tower will be an asset or an eyesore. Around the whole site, the new one-way system will soon start to be put in place and who can tell how this will work.

We have been in touch with the Council to express some of our concerns and are waiting to hear whether our suggestions have been incorporated. Then, even further to the west, the controversy over a third runway at Heathrow and the flight paths over south west London causes many to have sleepless nights.

A lot of decisions have to be taken on all these issues and let's trust that the conclusions reached will ensure a high degree of future contentment for us all.



The Tonsley Neighbourhood Watch

In April 2014 Gemma Lippiat and Suki Copeland decided to take on the challenge of establishing a Neighbourhood Watch Group for the Tonsleys as a whole. We all benefit from living in a great little community, unique in the centre of London, and we felt there was a need to be more active in protecting the essence of the area.

At our kick off meeting in The Alma we explained that our two key motives are enhancing both crime prevention and community togetherness. The more we work together and look out for each other the easier it will be to protect our area.

Supported by PC Mike Downey, our local policeman, we held a great discussion and, as a result, established Road Representatives to collectively raise and address specific issues. The Road Reps have subsequently met once a month in Konnigans and worked on various issues.

Our key issue in crime prevention is awareness – we have distributed the well recognized stickers for windows and are working on a crime prevention event at The Alma, establishment of a no-cold calling zone and informative top tips documents which we will distribute by post.
